## **Description of Agency or Boards**

The Department of Deaf and Hard of Hearing is the policy-making entity responsible for the administrative procedures in the provision of accessible telecommunication-related and interpreting related services as well as other activities pertinent to service provision for deaf, hard of hearing and deafblind people throughout the Commonwealth. Acting through the Director, the Department is authorized to adopt regulations necessary or incidental to the performance of duties or execution of powers conferred by law. Title 2.2, Chapter 40 of the Code of Virginia provides that the Department shall promulgate administrative procedures in the executive branch. The Department operates under the supervision of the Secretary of Health and Human Resources.
