Finance

Financial Overview

Funding to operate the Roanoke Higher Education Center is derived from state and local appropriations, revenue from rent and services paid by members who lease space, fees collected from proctored testing and monies resulting from use of the center's conference facilities.

Funds are expended to pay personnel, operate and maintain the center's facilities, and provide services to members and customers.

Anticipated Changes to Customer Base

The executive team of the Roanoke Higher Education Center is meeting with current colleges and universities who rent space, as well as reaching out to other institutions of higher education, to determine what new programs can be added. Continuing and professional education courses, certifications and endorsements will be put into place. New partnerships with Roanoke Blacksburg Technology Council, the Virginia Career Works and the Virginia Tech Carilion School of Medicine and Research Institute will bring about new customers. Also, collaborating with all higher education centers in the Commonwealth (Southwest, Southside, The New College and Danville Institute of Advanced Learning and Research) will create new and different collaborative programming. Adding new members to the Roanoke Higher Education Center's Foundation will create yet-to-be determined opportunities for new programming.

Provide academic testing services for workforce credentialing and certification programs

Summary and Alignment

The educational testing center offers proctoring for graduate school exams, national standardized tests, distance learning examinations, prior learning assessments, licensing exams, and other industry specific tests. The 22 seat computer based testing lab is a member of the Consortium of College Testing Centers (CCTC), a national group of college and university test centers that support distance learning opportunities by offering secure and comfortable test taking conditions. Partnerships continue to grow with major testing organizations such as College Board, Comira, Educational Testing Services (ETS), ISO-Quality Testing, PAN, Pearson VUE, Prometric and Western Governor's University (WGU). During 2018, the center administered over 4,000 exams.

Summary and Alignment

The Roanoke Higher Education Center provides small and large meeting spaces to businesses, industries, and community agencies. During 2017-2018, 74 organizations held 215 events, reflecting 7,511 visitors to the center. Clients range from economic development and governmental agencies, educational institutions, health care facilities, and non-profits. From computer labs to video conferencing, testing space to a welcoming receptions and café, clients from throughout the Commonwealth have offered positive feedback on the professional, state of the art meeting environment, as well as the availability of technology and video broadcasting equipment.

Key Risk Factors

Financial: The Roanoke Higher Education Center is dependent on the revenues from contributing partners for half its operating budget. The facility constructed in 1931 poses challenges with upkeep and continual maintenance issues. Based on this business model, the center could potentially be at risk due to any deviation in the current partnership structure.

Program Development: The changing face of the delivery of educational programs including degree completion, workforce development, GED completion and other services provide opportunities for growth and development, as well as, financial sustainability issues. This includes a mix of tradtional classroom courses and distance education. Other sources of revenue are in process, including the expansion of day rental activities and testing services.

Management Discussion

General Information About Ongoing Status of Agency

The center continues to meet the workforce needs in the community through various venues. Because, the Roanoke region is being transformed into a new avenue for potential clients in many arenas of business, healthcare and industry this growth provides the Roanoke Higher Education Center the ability to expand non-credit opportunities and add endorsement & credentialing programs to its portfolio.

Information Technology

The center continues to address technology infrastructure by upgrading servers, personal computers, laptops and software to meet ongoing needs. The annual allotment of Higher Education Equipment Trust Fund for 2019 is \$77,623.00.

Workforce Development

The center operates with a staff of 15 salaried and 6 part-time wage individuals.

Physical Plant

The center owns and operates two buildings of historical significance, one of which is listed on the National Register of Historic Places, that were both renovated and customized for use as educational facilities. The historic significance of the center's facilities requires special attention to ongoing maintenance needs. The facility supports 160,000 square feet of infrastructure including a separate facility for the culinary arts program. The center anticipates significant maintenance in the next five to ten years will be required to maintain the facilities due to the age of the facility. Maintenance reserve funding from the Commonwealth of Virginia will provide some of the ongoing maintenance efforts. Additional maintenance reserve funding may be required.

Description of this Program / Service Area

The Roanoke Higher Education Authority is a political subdivision of the Commonwealth of Virginia, formed in 1998 to stimulate economic growth in the Roanoke region by expanding access to educational resources at all levels. Programs afford individuals to earn a GED, receive an associate, bachelor's, master's or doctorate degree, as well as achieve workforce credentials and endorsements.

The center provides space for conferences, meetings, teleconferences and training to support the needs of the community.

An educational testing center offers proctoring for graduate school exams, national standardized tests, distance learning exams and other industry specific tests.

Anticipated Changes

The sustainability of the Roanoke Higher Education Center is contingent upon its partnering institutions and agencies and their desire to deliver programs to the citizens of the Roanoke region. Lease revenue constitutes almost half of our operating budget making it a challenge to retain and recruit new members. The reality of identifying other revenue sources is imminent. Measures have been taken to focus on day-rental activities and expansion of the educational testing center. A strategic planning process is in place as we conduct surveys and focus groups from all stakeholders (members of the Authority and Foundation boards, representatives from partner institutions, students, staff, and business, industry, and community leaders).

Factors Impacting

The sustainability of the Roanoke Higher Education Center is contingent upon partnering institutions leasing space. Resources must be allocated to enable the center to weather fluctuations in partners deciding to leave the center.

Funding to operate the Roanoke Higher Education Center is derived from state and local government appropriation, partnering institutions and revenues received from day rental & educational testing services.
